As researchers know, cemeteries are a great source for genealogical information. Part of our mission at Clay County Archives and Historical Library is to document cemeteries in the county. I would like to share a recent success story that highlights that aspect of

our mission. Lizzie Price Johnson,



daughter of Richard
Montgomery Gano Price
and Lucy Slaughter Price,
donated \$250,000 in
1926 to William Jewell
College. Part of that endowment was to perpetually maintain the family
cemetery, Price-Slaughter
-Nichols. Although Lizzie
is not buried there, her
parents and siblings are.

It came to the Archives' attention recently that the cemetery, also known as Strawberry Patch Cemetery, had been neglected and become overgrown. Over the years with changes in personnel, the

responsibility for cemetery upkeep had been overlooked. Diane Davidson. one of our volunteers, contacted William Jewell College to advise them about the condition of the cemetery. When William Jewell College realized it was responsible for the cemetery, the college quickly took action to remove the overgrown brush. The college has put procedures in place so that the Price-Slaughters -Nichols cemetery will not be forgotten again.

The cemetery committee and its volunteers are continuing the work of committee chairman Ken Neth. The Clay County Archives has information on more than 300 cemeteries. The volunteers continue to verify the location, burials and condition of Clay County cemeteries.

CLAY COUNTY, MISSOURI SEAL

It is ordered by the Couch that the Clerk procure a Seal of Office, and a good and entertained somes; and that the device of said seal be the Goddef of further with a pair of seales suspenced in her hand, and the words "Seal of Clay County Circuit Couch, Mo" be inclosed in the lines of said Seal; and it is further ordered that said leal to made use of by said Clerk as the seal of this Couch as soon as a sorew can be obtained

In November 1825, the Circuit Court of Clay County, Missouri, authorized the procurement of an official seal and described the design as follows: "the Goddess of Justice with a pair of scales suspended in her hand and the words 'seal of Clay County Circuit Court, Mo" within a circle. Though this documents in administrative action of the Court an early seal of the County Court, it is the reference to needing a "screw" for the seal that prompted interest.

A year later, the court authorized payment to William L. Smith for "a screw and apparatus for Circuit Court seal".

Early seals apparently used a screw to make the impression on the paper. The earliest device that may be similar to what was purchased in 1825 is from the Office Museum and was patented in the 1850's. The Clerk was reimbursed \$38.73 cents. It is only a guess that this device resembles what was used in Clay County in 1826.

RESEARCH TIP

A while back we discovered an online resource that is fantastic. If you haven't tried www.historicaerials.com then you are missing out on some great maps. The site allows you to go to an area on a modern aerial photo map and zoom in or out to the level of detail you need. But it also allows you to then switch to one of several older aerial photos of the same spot. Of course there were no aerial photo maps in the 19th century and few until the late 20th. But then you can also choose from several years of USGS topological maps and see how the roads and rivers and residences looked at points back in history. This is really good stuff if you are a map geek or just curious and have time to kill.

But then in doing some research for some areas I was familiar with I noticed that some houses I knew were built in the early 1950s didn't show up till maps from several years later. Even major changes in waterways that we know happened in the late 1940s didn't show up for another decade. So using these maps to try to date when your house was built or when some new road was opened must be taken with a grain of salt. Maybe a heavy scoop of salt. It seems that production of those topo maps must have taken years of work prior to them getting published. So the real changes on the ground likely happened a few years before the date shown on the maps.



Enjoy the maps but do be aware of the fairly lengthy time discrepancies.
